SMOKELESS TOBACCO

(Spit, Chew, Snuff, Snus)



The U.S. Surgeon General, National Cancer Institute, and other health authorities have clearly shown that smokeless tobacco is harmful. However, new products are being developed and marketed that are appealing to kids and attractive to smokers who are trying to quit.









Many small cigars are being designed to look almost identical to cigarettes, yet they are taxed differently, making them more affordable for kids and cigarette smokers who are trying to kick the habit. Several types of cigars and little cigars come in kid-friendly candy flavors as well.

E-CIGARETTES

(E-hookahs, E-cigars, E-pipes, Hookah Pens, Vape Pens)

E-JUICE



E-cigarettes are devices that allow users to inhale a vapor containing nicotine or other substances. They are generally battery-operated and use a vaporizer to heat a refillable cartridge that then releases a chemical-filled vapor. They come in many flavors such as gummy bear, strawberry, cherry crush and cotton candy. Each e-cigarette is different. Some can be customized with the concentration of nicotine in the flavored "juice," the amount of the draw and the temperature of the hit. The health consequences of the inhalants and the vapors they give off are unknown. There is currently no scientific evidence establishing the safety of e-cigarettes.

A hookah is a water pipe used to pass charcoal heated air through a tobacco mixture and ultimately through a water-filled chamber. The charcoal or burning embers are placed on top of a perforated aluminum foil and the tobacco mixture is placed below. The user inhales the water filtered smoke through a tube and mouthpiece. The water lowers the temperature of the smoke. Hookahs are often shared by several users in a smoking session. The tobacco mixtures used in the hookahs are called shisha, boory, narghile, goza, arghileh, or hubble bubble.
