- Stop the Killing
- Stop the Dying
- Evacuate the Area



When the Police Arrive

- Follow commands
- Show your palms
- Do not move



Medical

- EMS Delay
- People Need Help
- Seek training



Plan ahead

Risk Assessment

Work with local police



Personnel Issues

- Expect mental trauma
- Develop a critical incident stress management plan
